Kevin McCarthy is a Senior Executive Vice President and General Counsel of BNY Mellon. Kevin began his legal career as an associate at Willkie Farr & Gallagher.

He is the current Chair of The Clearing House Association Board of Directors and a Member of The Association of General Counsel.
