How to Get a Non-Driver License ID

A government-issued ID is helpful for establishing your identity and accessing important services, like health care and housing. If you do not have a Driver's License, you have two options: a New York State ID (NYS ID) or a New York City ID (IDNYC).

- NYS ID: official photo ID with basically the same benefits as a Driver License except you cannot drive. You must have lawful immigration status to apply.
- * (Below is a more detailed comparison.)

IDNYC: while not as widely accepted as valid photo ID, it
is accepted for some important purpose (e.g., by NYPD, to
apply for SNAP, etc.) Any NYC resident can apply regardless
of immigration status.

Having an NYS ID is preferable if you're able to get it. There are three types:

- **Standard:** valid state ID but cannot be used for federal purposes (e.g., entering a federal building or flying)
- Real ID: valid ID for state and federal purposes. This is the ID most people will want to get, if possible.
- Enhanced ID: valid ID for state and federal purposes
 plus traveling from Mexico, Canada, and some Caribbean
 countries by land/sea (not air) to the U.S. Must be a <u>U.S.</u>
 <u>Citizen</u> to obtain.

You can get **both** an NYS ID and an IDNYC. IDNYC offers free and discounted benefits at lots of cultural institutions and sporting events within NYC that NYS ID does **not** offer.

Step 1: Gather Required Documents

- Within 120 days (about 4 months) from your prison release date, you can apply for a NYS ID with your NYS DOCCS Released Offender Identification Card. In addition, you will need:
 - → U.S. Birth Certificate
 - → Social Security Card
 - Parole Release Papers (if you do not have Parole Papers, obtain a letter from the Superintendent at your Facility upon release), and
 - → If you changed your name due to marriage, Marriage Certificate



- If you are outside of the 120 days from release, you will need
 to provide a combination of documents. Best to use the
 online worksheet or screening tool to confirm you have all
 the necessary documents: <a href="https://dmv.ny.gov/non-driver-id/get-a-non
- All documents must be either original or certified by the issuing agency.
- If you are a U.S. Veteran, you can add a Veteran designation added to your NYS ID with proof of veteran status: http://dmv.ny.gov/more-info/veteran-status-designation-on-a-photo-document

Step 2: Complete the Application (Form MV-44)

• If you cannot fill out the form ahead of time, you can get a copy at the DMV office.

Step 3: Make a Reservation at the DMV Office

Reservations are not required, but they are strongly encouraged.

Step 4: Go to DMV Appointment

- Be sure to bring:
 - → All required documents
 - → The completed application (if you were able to fill it out ahead of time)
 - → The application fee:
 - » https://dmv.ny.gov/non-driver-id/non-driver-id-feesand-refunds
 - » You can pay via: Cash; Credit Card; Debit Card that doesn't require a PIN; Mobile payment methods (e.g., Apple Pay); or Personal Check or Money Order payable to "Commissioner of Motor Vehicle." (You can also split payments between cash and check.)
 - » If you are seeking a free or reduced fee ID, also bring proof of SSI, Public Assistance, SNAP, or Medical Assistance.

- Your documents will be checked, and you will have your photo taken.
- You will receive a temporary document that will be valid for 60 days.

Step 5: Receive Your NYS ID

- You will receive your ID by mail in about 3 weeks. They will
 mail it to the address on the ID.

Step 1: Gather Required Documents

- You will need to provide a combination of documents. Best to use the online worksheet or screening tool to confirm you have all the necessary documents: https://www.nyc.gov/ site/idnyc/card/application-materials.page#idnycdocguide
- NYC uses a points system where different types of documents are worth a different amount of points. A few notes to help understand the system:
 - All of your documents together must total 4 points.
 - At least 3 points must prove Identity and at least 1 point must prove Residency.
 - → At least 1 document must have a photo (unless applicant is 10-21 or disabled and accompanied by a caretaker).
 - At least 1 document must include a date of birth (DOB)



- If you are living in a shelter, you can prove Residency with one of the following:
 - Letter from Shelter
 - Letter from organization providing services with permission to use care of address
 - Letter from organization providing services (card will not have an address on it)

Be sure to use form from the ID NYC Application website

- If you are a U.S. Veteran, you can add a Veteran designation added to your IDNYC with proof of veteran status
- All documents must be either originals or certified by the issuing agency
- No expired documents unless explicitly mentioned.
- Names on the documents must be consistent with each other.

You must print out the form and sign by hand.

If you cannot fill out the form ahead of time, you can get a copy at the IDNYC Enrollment Center.

Step 3: Schedule an Appointment: https://www.nyc.gov/site/idnyc/card/start-your-application.page

- Appointments are usually required and typically last about 20 minutes.
 - It's easiest to book online. Appointment times are released on Friday for the following week. If you can, print out the confirmation page once you make the appointment.
 - If you cannot book online, you can call 311 to schedule the appointment.
- A few locations take walk-ins without an appointment, including the Brooklyn Public Library (on Tuesdays) and Queens Public Library (on Fridays).
- If you cannot travel to an Enrollment Center due to a disability, you can request a reasonable accommodation by calling 311 or submit an online inquiry: https://www.nyc.gov/ site/idnyc/contact/feedback.page

Go to the IDNYC Appointment

- Be Sure to Bring: all required documents and the completed application (if you were able to fill it out ahead of time)
- At the Appointment: an IDNYC staff member will
 - Review your documents
 - Ask basic info (name, address, date of birth)
 - Take your photo

Step 5: Receive your IDNYC

- You will receive your IDNYC by mail within 10-14 business days.
- If you do not have a stable address or you are a domestic violence survivor who does not want your address on the card, you can pick up your IDNYC at the Enrollment Center.
