

How to Replace a Social Security Card



A Social Security number is important for employment, accessing government benefits and services, obtaining an identification card, and opening a bank account among other things.

Usually just the number is sufficient, but you may need the actual card for certain things. For instance, it is far easier to obtain a government-issued photo ID if you have your Social Security Card.

Any U.S. Citizen or anyone with current lawful, work-authorized immigration status can apply for a Social Security Card. If you have not previously received a Social Security number, you must apply in person at your local Social Security Office (https://secure.ssa.gov/ICON/main.jsp).

If you believe you have previously been issued a Social Security Number, you can follow the steps below to request a Social Security Card. They are *free*. (You can receive up to 3 cards in a calendar year and 10 in a lifetime. Cards issued to reflect changes to your legal name or work authorization do not count.)

Step 1: Gather Required Documents

- Typically you must provide one of the following documents to prove your identity and age:
 - → U.S. Driver License
 - → Non-Driver State-Issued ID
 - → U.S. Passport or passport card
 - → Health Insurance or Medicaid Card that shows (i) your name and (ii) photograph, age, or DOB
 - Medical record from clinic, doctor, or hospital that shows (i) name, (ii) age or DOB, (iii) treatment within last 2 years, and (iv) signature or stamp from provider (cannot be a bill, payment receipt, or admission letter)
 - → Employee ID that shows (i) your name and (ii) photograph or DOB
 - → U.S. Military ID Card
 - → Certificate of Naturalization or U.S. Citizenship
 - → Permanent Resident Card (I-551) ("Green card")
 - → Employment Authorization Document (I-766) ("Work Permit")

- If you do not have any of the above documents, you can try submitting the application with one or more documents that show your identity and age including:
 - → Prison Release Papers
 - → NYS DOCCS Released Offender Identification Card
 - → School identity card
 - → Shelter Residency Letter
- If you were born outside the U.S., you must also provide a
 document issued by the Department of Homeland Security
 (e.g., Form I-551, I-94, I-766) to prove your U.S. Citizenship or
 current lawful, work-authorized status.
- All documents must either be originals or certified copies with raised seal, stamp, or signature.
- All documents must be unexpired.



Step 2: Complete the Application

Online: https://www.ssa.gov/number-card/replace-card

- You may be able to start your application online, if you:
 - → Know your Social Security Number
 - → Have a U.S. mailing address
 - Don't need to make any changes to your record (other than Name Change)
- You will need to follow the prompts on the screen and create an account.
- Once you complete the application online, you must go to your local Social Security office within 45 calendar days.

Hard Copy: print the form and complete it by hand (be sure to use only black or blue ink!) https://www.ssa.gov/forms/ss-5.pdf

 You can either go or mail the completed application and documents to your local Social Security office.

While the Social Security Administration says they will send your documents back, we strongly recommend going in person, so you do not lose your documents.

Step 3: Make An Appointment

- Appointments are required at all the NYC locations.
- Call 800-772-1213 or try the number for the office you plan to go to. Be prepared for a long wait time when you call. You also have the option to have the office call you back.

Step 4: Go to the Social Security Office

• Be Sure to Bring: all your documents and, if you filled out a hard-copy application, the completed application

Step 5: Receive Your Social Security Card

- · You should receive your card by mail within 14 business days. You can receive your card at a P.O. Box Address.
- You may also be able to have your card made to the Social Security Office for you to pick up.
